Issue 1 – 2023 Term 2

I can't believe we are in Week 4 of Term 2 already. It has been an extremely busy term and a half, but also very enjoyable. In this newsletter, Brian and I would like to bring everyone up-to-date with some big-ticket items that are having or will have an effect on our school and in particular, student learning and engagement.

Deputy Principal Position

As the school had been allocated a deputy principal, Brian ran a recruitment process at the end of Term 1. We are delighted to have Mr Pree Jeewandara starting at Calen next week. Pree was the deputy principal up at Doomadgee State School.

Message from Mr O'Neill

I wish to advise that I will be on leave for a large part of the rest of the year. Later this month, I need to have surgery to have something cut out of the top of my head. When I recover from this, I have two further surgical procedures. Some of you may be aware that I have been having regular injections in my eyes to treat the swelling and bleeding at the back of the macula. Added to this condition, I have also been diagnosed as having cataracts in both eyes and my vision has been deteriorating rapidly. The surgeon could not operate until the bleeding and swelling were under control. They are now under control and I am scheduled for surgery next month.

My new theme song is going to be "I can see clearly now." However, don't expect to hear me sing it - I am tone deaf!

My leave next semester is designed to assist me to travel the state to support the principals of the other eighty-three combined sector (P-10 and P-12) schools around the state, and present papers at conferences in Normanton, the Torres Straits and Costa Rica. Taking leave will permit me to accept these invitations without interrupting the school. In addition, it will also permit me to work on PHD research and thesis.

However, I will still be around – I love this school and everyone associated with it. I intend to be here to assist in orientating our new deputy principal, Pree into the school, continue to work with the debating teams (although Pree Jeewandara and Alli Luckel have volunteered to assist) and work with the staff.

Student attendance -why does it matter?

Regular school attendance gives students a better chance at life. Students achieve better when they go to school all day, every school day because:

- they have increased access to learning opportunities
- they maintain friendships
- they stay connected to their learning

- they develop self-efficacy as a learner
- they have better long-term life outcomes.

The school is working extremely hard to ensure all of our students have equality through having access to high quality and engaging learning in a safe, supportive environment. If your child doesn't attend, they can't access it. Here are some statistics from the first 13 weeks of school:

- o Our overall attendance rate is 89.2% (slightly higher than similar P-12 schools)
- 54 of our students have less than 85% attendance rate. (16 primary and 38 secondary). Of these students, there are 13 primary and 25 secondary students whose attendance is below 80% (they are missing on average one day per week)
- o We have 37 primary and 28 secondary students who have an attendance rate of between 95-100%.

Even though our overall student attendance is pretty good, we will continue to work diligently in this space to ensure all of students have the same learning opportunities. The first part of this is to enable all students to attend.

School Review

Thank you to all the parents and carers who participated in our School Review at the end of Term 1. The reviewers looked closely at our school's performance data, and teaching and learning curriculum documentation, and spoke with a wide range of staff, students, parents, carers and community members to get an accurate picture of the school.

Yesterday we received the final Review Report from the review team. We will be working through the report with staff and our Assistant Regional Director too so our school's new 4-year strategic plan can be developed. The Review Report will be available on our school website later in Week 7.

Updated Australian Curriculum

The Australian Curriculum sets out, through content descriptions and achievement standards, what students should be taught and achieve, as they progress through school. All our lesson plans and units of work are derived from the Australian Curriculum.

In June 2022, the Minister for Education, Minister for Industrial Relations and Minister for Racing, Grace Grace announced the department expectations for using the updated Australian Curriculum in Queensland schools.

A staged implementation schedule for P-6 was released to ensure a smooth transition to the updated curriculum in reasonable timeframes, considering the workload of teachers. For our secondary school, we are in the process of developing an implementation schedule to ensure that all learning areas of Version 9 of the Australian Curriculum (ACV9) are implemented by the end of 2026.

We can make local decisions about the timing of implementation and is using 2023 as a familiarisation year. When making decisions about which learning areas and year levels we will first focus on, we need to consider school and departmental priorities, continuity of learning for students, and teacher workload, particularly for teachers working across multiple learning areas.



Our teachers have been undertaking internal and external professional learning to familiarise themselves with the updated curriculum. Our 2023 in-school professional learning schedule includes the planning and implementation of the updated learning areas within the Australian Curriculum.



National Sorry Day

Those children stolen from their families have become known as the Stolen Generations. Many survivors have provided an account of the violence they endured and the ongoing pain they experience as they try to find their families. While some have managed to find their families, many have not. This has left an indelible pain that resonates in all aspects of their lives.

The exact number of children who were removed may never be known. However, there are very few families who have been left unaffected. In some families, children from three or more generations were taken.

On this day, we acknowledge the ongoing grief and loss experienced by many individuals and families, and we recognise the pain and intergenerational trauma that continues.


